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The Stockyards, Arizona's Original Steakhouse: Where Arizona History Lives

As Arizona begins the centennial countdown, head over to The Stockyards and 1889 Saloon to experience a piece of Arizona history, but make sure to do it at happy hour for some truly mouth-watering deals.

Opened in 1947, this Phoenix landmark offers complimentary ground tenderloin sliders made daily from the hand-cut trim of the house filet mignon and new york strips. Step back in time with a sip of the infamous Stockyard's Baron's Manhattan created to honor Edward A. Tovrea, Arizona's original cattle baron and first owner of the historic restaurant.

Stockyards offers their happy hour menu Monday through Friday which includes \$3 domestic bottled beer, \$4 well drinks, \$5 house wine, \$2 off all draft beers and \$2 off all of the

items on the Saloon snacks menu.

The menu's depth and diversity will astound and please even the toughest taskmasters. Entrees such as pan fried blue cornmeal crusted rainbow trout with poblano hominy grits and bourbon pecan brown butter, double thick spice brined pork rib chop with cornbread dressing and apple jicama chutney, or the calve's liver with caramelized onions, smoked bacon, whipped potatoes and mustard sauce will complicate the decision making process.

Appetizers range from a

delectable chile and peppercorn crusted sirloin carpaccio, to a toothsome take on duck enchiladas with red chile sauce and the famous calf fries with roasted red pepper and chipotle sauce. The dessert menu is hearty and meant for sharing, featuring generous seasonal fruit cobblers with vanilla bean ice cream, chocolate-chocolate bread pudding, citrus burnt cream, and a brown cow root beer float for grown-ups, made with the Stockyards' own house brand of root beer and a shot of Jack Daniel's.

Lunchtime favorites include the Stockyards steak sandwich with grilled onions and mushrooms, Jack

cheese and horseradish sauce, a shaved prime rib and smoked cheddar on rye, and a hot pastrami with coleslaw, Swiss cheese and Louis dressing. A signature lunch item, the fire-roasted vegetable and chicken salad with chipotle dressing, offers a contemporary twist.

So revisit an old flame this spring for a relaxing evening of sizzling specials and historically great hospitality at the 63-year-old, independently owned and operated landmark: The Stockyards Restaurant & 1889 Saloon.
